SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT TO OFFER FREE **SOIL TESTING TO MORGAN COUNTY FARMERS**



The Morgan County Conservation District is excited to continue a program that will be paying for up to 3 soil tests for farmers in Morgan County. Stop by the Soil Conservation District at 955 Prestonsburg St., West Liberty, KY at the USDA Service Center for vouchers and soil test bags. Soil samples can be dropped off to the Morgan Co. Cooperative Extension Service to be submitted to the UK laboratory for analysis. These test can be for hay, pasture, gardens and agronomic crops such as corn, soybeans, wheat and tobacco.



FALL HORTICULTURE TIPS



Although we passed the best time for seeding, lawns will benefit from a fall application of nitrogen. October and November are excellent months to feed as you can promote vigor without excessive growth. Mow new grass seedlings when they reach 2.5 inches tall. Continue to mow lawns as late as needed. When you are finished with tools and equipment for the season clean, sharpen, and oil tools for next year. Make sure to drain, or add fuel stabilizer to, gasoline powered equipment. If you have not dug and stored tender bulbs like dahlias, cannas, and gladiolus, do so before the ground freezes. Clean up perennial foliage if you had any disease issues this year. This will help prevent the problem next year. Drain and store garden hoses and irrigation systems. November is an excellent time to plant fall bulbs for next spring. Start a compost pile with all those leaves. It doesn't have to be elaborate or technical. A simple pile will make compost if left long enough. Plant paperwhites, amaryllis and other ready-to-bloom bulbs for the holidays. Protect the trunks of fruit trees with wire mesh to prevent gnawing damage from rabbits and voles. Do a thorough cleanup of the vegetable garden. This will remove many insect and disease problems before they can become a problem next year. Monitor houseplants for insect problems. Most common pests can be controlled if detected before they become major infestations.

Registration is now live for the 2025 Kentucky Fruit & Vegetable Conference!

The 2025 Kentucky Fruit and Vegetable Conference will be Monday and Tuesday January 6-7, 2025 with pre-conference events on Sunday, Jan. 5 at the Marriott Lexington Griffin Gate Golf Resort & Spa in Lexington, KY.

This premier, state-wide event annually brings together approximately 600 growers, researchers, and technical support providers. The conference is devoted to fruit, vegetable, and cut flower production, handling, harvesting, marketing, storage, and related topics. The conference kicks-off with pre-conference events including fruit and vegetable grower roundtable discussions with university specialists where the group debriefs on the production year, challenges are discussed and questions are answered. The main conference program has more than 20 different educational tracks with more than 70 speakers. The trade show offers more than 60 vendors featuring horticulture products and services.

Forage Timely Tips: November

- Apply 30-40 lbs./N/acre to strengthen cool-season grass sods.
- Inventory hay and assess hay quality.
- Using a plate meter or grazing stick, estimate stockpile available for winter grazing.
- Adjust animal numbers or purchase additional hay to balance forage-feed supply to livestock

needs.

• Graze crops residues and cover crops that will not overwinter. Be careful to avoid fields that

contain johnson grass until after these plants have dried up.

- Graze winter annuals that will not overwinter such as brassicas and oats.
- Graze other winter annuals once they are 6-8 inches tall and are well anchored. Do
 NOT graze closer to 4 inches.
- Sugar content will rise in tall fescue with the cool temperatures and short days of
